* Territories are now recognised as the most relevant level of social inclusion

People, through their resistence have invented solutions

* We are now working to achieve joinedup thinking on how to build these into policy that can be adapted to each specific territory's needs

- * Climate change negotiations recognise that implementation will be led by territories and will be CSO-driven (Analysis by Pierre Radanne, 4F)
- * Mike Lewis (Resilience Imperative: towards a steady state economy) considers Food Sovereignty as the most developed global form of solidarity economy
- * Local and Regional Government in Europe is geographically closest to people's issues and devolution of power and finance often mean that it is possible to enact solidarity economy policies such as public procurement

Allotments, Community gardens, Edible landscapes...


Social enterprise for local food processing Organised small-scale farmers' unions, fishers and landless peoples' movements (Via Campesina)
